

ENA's mission is to heal, rescue, and lift our brothers and sisters in Africa. Our purpose is to provide resources and training to vulnerable populations, enabling them to become self-reliant and substantially improve their lives. We accomplish our mission by developing greater capacity in the individuals and communities we serve. We focus on the fundamental building blocks that lead to individual selfreliance, including clean water, sanitation, health, education, micro-credit, and other income-generating activities that strengthen families and build communities.





Clean water is transformative, especially in remote areas where individuals must travel great distances to find it. No water infrastructure often results in children missing school and women walking long distances. Access to clean water restores health, saves valuable time, and allows children to focus on their studies. At ENA, we have witnessed firsthand the profound impact clean water has on families and communities.

The Korke water system will provide clean water to over 8,000 people in fourteen villages in Debre Zeit. This project is more than an infrastructure improvement; it's a lifeline that brings hope and change to thousands of families. Each community receives comprehensive hygiene training to promote healthy practices as part of the construction process. A water committee is also selected and trained to maintain the well, ensuring its long-term sustainability. Community members eagerly anticipate the completion of the water system in 2024 and look forward to the improvements in their personal health and education opportunities for their children.



## Building Bright Futures: ENA's Commitment to Orphan Children in Bishoftu



In 2023, ENA sponsored **350 orphans** in three large districts in Bishoftu. Teachers reported that these children thrived in their schools. If a child is orphaned, ENA will provide school uniforms, books, and materials for the upcoming school year. We acknowledge the dedicated efforts of teachers, caretakers, and staff who work to ensure these children receive the love and support they deserve to thrive in the early stages of their life.





## ENGINEERING DREAMS: GELANO'S STORY

ENA's unique ability to bless lives empowers vulnerable individuals by removing barriers to education and providing critical support, enabling them to build self-reliance and move themselves out of poverty.

Gelano Rago is a 17-year-old from Watiju village. He lost his mother and father at age four. Due to Gelano's crippled arm, his uncle was ashamed and refused to send him to school. When Gelano was seven, ENA discovered his situation and helped him attend school. Gelano is a gifted student and is currently in 11th grade. He attends a special high school and is preparing for college, where he intends to pursue engineering.

# **HUMAN TRAFFICKING**



## **194,981** PEOPLE HAVE RECEIVED PREVENTION TRAINING

AS OF DECEMBER 31, 2023

ENA partnered with leaders from domestic and international human rights organizations to help eradicate human trafficking. Our team in Ethiopia works with the Ministry of Education, Women and Child Affairs, Social and Labor Affairs, The International Organization for Migration (IOM), and local law enforcement.

We train teachers who return to their schools to train staff and educate students. Each of the 22 schools has approximately 1,000-1,500 students. School leadership have created afterschool programs that offer young people a safe gathering place and access to information and materials on human trafficking tricks, tactics, and other prevention methods. ENA has also hosted radio broadcasts in local open markets, reaching over 30,000 people weekly.

Our goals are to create awareness of human trafficking in local communities through sensitization programs, educate vulnerable groups on modern slavery perpetuated by human traffickers, and expose the conditions that allow traffickers to thrive.

## EMPOWERING WOMEN ENTREPRENEURS

## **TEACHING BUSINESS SKILLS**

### In 2023, all 300 women successfully graduated from ENA's incoming generating course. In 2024, 200 women will receive another round of funding.

Our efforts to eliminate poverty multiply as we help women develop the skills and confidence to build and maintain a business of their choice. Our business training program teaches women how to start, grow, and maintain a business. Our team works with women's groups to help them identify their needs and find locally available business resources.

We provide a support network by organizing the women into committees, where they help motivate one another and share advice on growing their businesses. The committees meet weekly with our staff to share their successes and difficulties. ENA offers each woman support, assistance, and encouragement on her journey to financial independence.

# **RESTORING SIGHT:** CATARACT CAMPAIGNS IN ETHIOPIA

Our cataract care program delivers high-quality, efficient eye care to underserved and vulnerable communities, dramatically improving the lives of thousands.

ENA partners with skilled ophthalmologists and local clinicians to deliver cataract surgeries to blind adults in hundreds of communities throughout Debre Zeit. Our partners have perfected surgical methodologies optimized for low-resource environments. The communities we serve have access to local health posts and are always pre-screened for cataracts, eye infections, and low vision before surgery.



In Ethiopia, 1.1 million people suffer from cataract blindness due to lack of eye care, poor nutrition, trauma, and untreated eye infections

## ENRICHING LIVES THROUGH EDUCATION

In 2023, ENA Ghana enrolled 1,940 new adult learners in its literacy programs while graduating 1,201 literate adults.

ENA believes literacy and numeracy are vital skills for impoverished men and women to become self-reliant. We address critical needs in vulnerable communities by providing intensive literacy courses to adults. We believe that mobilizing local resources builds communities from the inside.

ENA has impacted the lives of over **40,000** households in Ghana, helping them transition out of poverty. Since **2014**, our program has enrolled **13,469** illiterate adults.

# **JOB SKILLS FOR A BRIGHTER FUTURE**







### ENS's vocational training program has indirectly impacted over 1,700 individuals throughout Ghana.

ENA is committed to fostering sustainable development by investing in vocational skills training that enables individuals to secure sustainable livelihoods. Through tailored initiatives, we address local needs and empower families to break the cycle of poverty, contributing to the socio-economic development of communities and fostering a brighter future for generations to come.

Approximately **65%** of participants in our vocational training actively use the skills acquired, with over **50%** starting micro-businesses in liquid soap, bleach, and disinfectant production. Over **30%** market their products via social media to expand their customer base.

Individuals with albinism face not only health concerns associated with their condition, including compromised vision and high risk of skin cancer, but also cultural stigmas making it difficult to receive an education or maintain long-term employment.

In 2023, ENA made significant strides in advancing awareness and support for individuals with albinism across the country through education, medical access, and financial support.

Focusing on the Greater Accra, Northern, Volta, and Eastern regions, we educated 6,500 students and teachers through school visits. We sensitized over 90,000 individuals through community-based gatherings that included chiefs, queen mothers, assemblymen, pastors, and other opinion leaders.

We invited community members and media to celebrate International Albinism Awareness Day with the theme "Inclusion is Strength." Workshops and presentations by experts such as dermatologists and psychologists fostered greater understanding.

# HUMAN TRAFFICKING THIS YEAR ENA RESCUED 108 INDIVIDUALS IN GHANA.

ENA actively works to rescue individuals who are exploited and trafficked. We work with dedication to ending all forms of trafficking and exploitation through our End Modern Slavery (EMS) initiative. Our team collaborates with more than **20** government organizations, international NGOs, law enforcement, and local communities to identify and rescue trafficked persons, offering them immediate support and a path toward rehabilitation.

Our primary focus is prevention. Our teams teach vulnerable communities prevention tactics. We partner with local specialized organizations to assist in rescuing and rehabilitating survivors. We also assist law enforcement agencies, attorneys general, and prosecutors who arrest and imprison traffickers and enslavers. Through our rescue initiatives, ENA has reached over **3.5 million** people. "There is a need for all members of society, including political leaders, local stakeholders, and governments, to stand up and help fight against child labor, child trafficking, and other modern slavery-related issues."

# **HOUSE OF HOPE**

ENA's House of Hope offers all rescued individuals a safe and secure place to reside, where they can access all healing resources, including medical and psychological care, legal aid, rehabilitation, and skill development.

Our team works closely with rescued individuals, families, caregivers, and local partners to create opportunities for social reintegration, assist with short and longterm goals, and connect survivors to ongoing support networks, helping them recover and rebuild their lives.





### FROM EXPLOITATION TO EMPOWERMENT

Traffickers lured Angel via social media with promises of travel documents to Cote d'Ivoire, but instead, they forced her into sexual exploitation. After escaping, another trafficker captured her, and she became pregnant. A good Samaritan helped her receive medical attention, where a doctor identified her as a trafficking victim and referred her to Ghana's Department of Social Welfare and ENA. Angel recovered at ENA's Hope transitional shelter. Our partners then assisted her in moving into a safe community and trained her on starting and growing a business.

# **MATTRU CLINIC** BRINGING MATERNAL HEALTH CLOSE TO HOME

### **OUR IMPACT**

In June 2022, Bo's District Medical Office upgraded the Mattru Maternal Child Post to a Community Health Center. Our clinic received this designation by improving healthcare infrastructure while upskilling clinical staff, lab equipment, bedding, and other medical essentials. The installation of a medical laboratory, in partnership with Sunrider International, has provided means for accurate diagnostics, leading to better health outcomes for women. These enhancements have significantly elevated the quality of care for the Mattru community and the eleven surrounding communities. On March 10, 2023, ENA nurses conducted a community outreach in Toubu village, treating **258** patients. Another outreach in Kpawama Village treated **87** patients, showcasing the team's dedication to providing medical care to remote areas.

# **STRENGTHENING COMMUNITIES**



## THE POWER OF LITERACY TO INSPIRE CHANGE

### Our literacy program is transforming adult lives by enhancing their skills and driving socioeconomic progress, inspiring growth and opportunity for over 900 participants.

Since January 2023, ENA's literacy program has made remarkable strides, with **318** individuals completing vocational and skill training across **15** centers in the Bo District. Staffed by **24** dedicated facilitators, the program supports **900** participants, empowering them with essential literacy and numeracy skills. The program's success is further underscored by **six graduates** advancing to Njala University's teacher certificate program, showcasing the program's transformative impact. With over **800** graduates, our literacy initiative not only increases adults reading skills but also drives socio-economic development, inspiring hope and progress for the future of Sierra Leone's economic and social success.

### The Journey from Mining to Adult Education and Self-Reliance

### Currently, 180 illiterate men and women are learning how to read and write in the Sembehun area.

Sembehun-17 is located in a diamond mining area near Bo, where most residents were involved in mining activities. With the depletion of diamonds in the region, community members realized the significance of educating their minds as a gateway to a broader world. As a result, illiterate adults have shifted their focus towards building selfreliance through educational advancement.



# THE POWER OF EDUCATION



### A NEW ERA OF LEARNING AT TOBU SCHOOL

In October 2023, ENA partnered with a private donor to provide **250** primary-age children in Tobu School with a teacher, computer hardware, manuals, and user guides. Tobu's head teacher, John Charles, believes that proper instruction and computers provide young people access to critical learning resources and unique educational opportunities while helping bridge knowledge gaps and improve digital skills for children in remote communities. Daily classes offer engaging learning opportunities and personalized education for students as they prepare for their future in higher education.







### NURTURING CHILDREN'S EDUCATIONAL POTENTIAL

In September 2023, ENA distributed school materials to **115** children from amputee families in Mattru on the Rail. Our initiative aimed to ensure every child has access to education, regardless of societal status. Representatives from the **Ministry of Education** urged parents to monitor their children's academic performance and take full advantage of offered educational resources. They also thanked ENA for supporting the government's efforts to provide quality education to vulnerable children.

# **CLEAN WATER**



ENA constructed clean water wells for five primary schools in the Bo School District in response to a request by the Deputy Director of Schools under the Ministry of Education, Science, and Technology.

### 90% of Schools in the Bo District Lack Access to Clean Water.

Due to ENA's reputation for supporting children and education, Ministry representatives requested assistance in providing clean water for schoolchildren. Schools were chosen based on the urgency of need and high enrollment rates. ENA partnered with the Ministries of Education, Health, and Water Resources. Each school set up a water committee of six students responsible for cleaning and maintaining each well.

## 4,943

Students will have access to clean water at school.

In addition to school projects, eight broken wells were rehabilitated, ensuring the communities had continued access to clean and safe drinking water. ENA also constructed a hand pump for the Theresa Hakim Community Health Clinic in Njagbla, serving over **11,000** people in the community and addressing a critical need for clean water.
